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Performance note:

Each song is performed twice (or partially twice). Songs 1, 2, and 5 begin piano only first time then the singers joins the piano on the repeat. Songs number 3 ends with piano only.

Songs 4 - Two Voyagers 

At the end of songs 3, the pianist depresses the notated chords silently and holds the chords with the middle pedal during song 4. While holding the middle pedal, the pianist stands to access the piano strings. Song 4 begins with the pianist lightly running the fleshy part of their finger over the piano strings up and down the approximate area of the held chords. All the strings should be rung, but only the notes of the held chords will sustain. Between the glissandi there should either be pauses, or the three high note figures can be plucked. After a while, the singers begins. The tempo is quite free with plenty of time between phrases. The piano stops playing when the singer reaches the red butterfly. The singer then continues unaccompanied to the end of the song.

Total duration: approx. 12 minutes.


